# When to use the GSC data set?

## If looking for:

- Data relevant to **young children** (from age 0 to 8)
- Young children at percent of poverty level
- Young children in poverty by race/ethnicity
- Prenatal care and birth outcomes
- Infant mortality by race/ethnicity
- Child care centers
- Great Start Readiness Program Enrollment
- Test scores for 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> grade

- Most recent five years of data available as of September 2019
- By county and Great Start Collaborative region

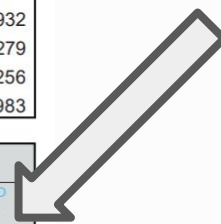

# Economic security mimics state

	Michigan	Ingham	Trend
Childhood poverty (0 - 17)	19.3%	19.1%	Improving since 2010
0 - 5 poverty	23.7%	24%	Improving since 2014
0 - 5 extreme poverty (50% FPL)	11.2%	10.8%	Improving since 2014
0 - 5 low income (200% FPL)	46.6%	44.8%	Improving since 2014

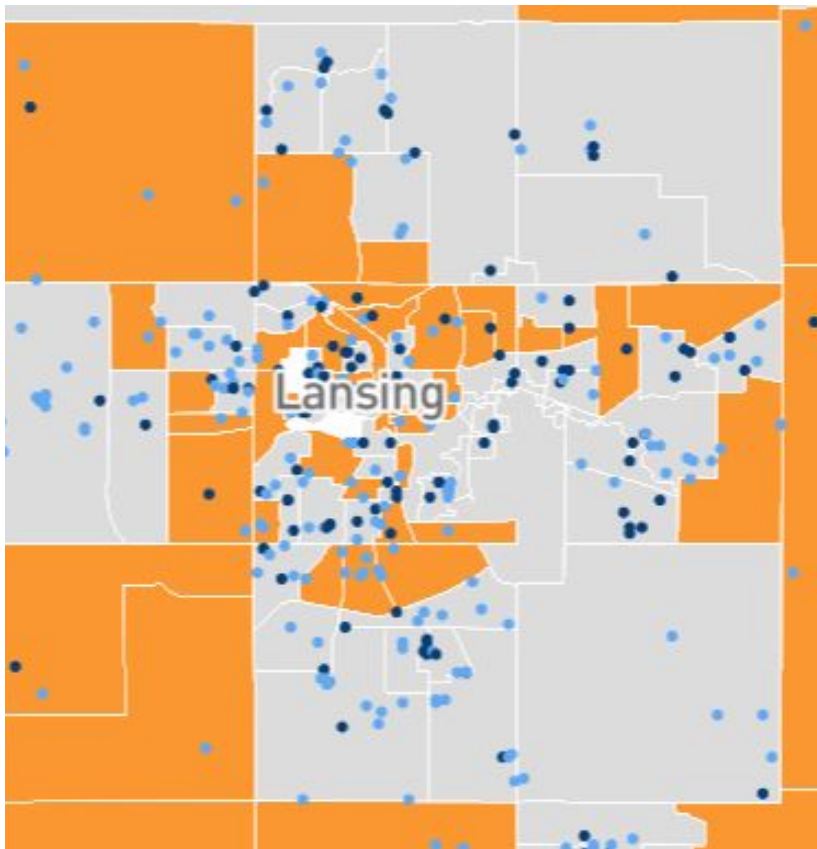

According to Great Start to Quality Child Care Status Survey, nearly 30% of childcare programs in Ingham are closed. Home based providers are more likely to be open; there are 126 family & group home providers in the county.



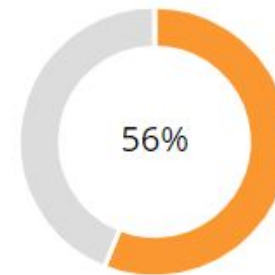

## Greater Lansing

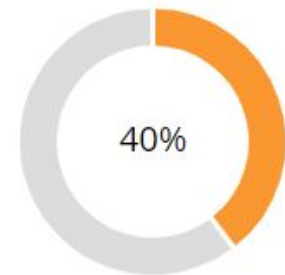

Lowest-income neighborhoods

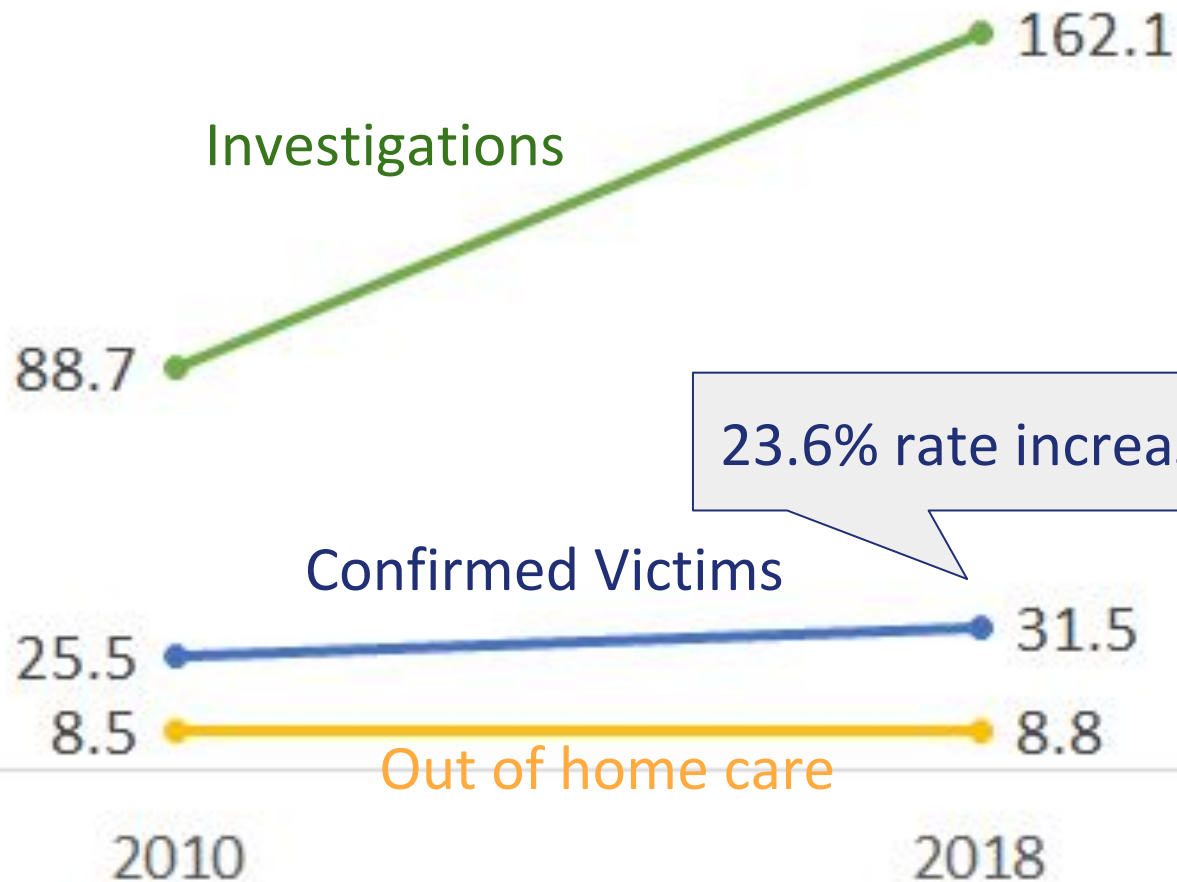


Highest-income neighborhoods

# Layers of question asking

Individual	Structural	Structural / Policy Solutions
How many women start and discontinue breastfeeding?	How many women have access to paid family leave?  What workplace / community space policies are in place to support breastfeeding?	Paid leave is associated with increased breastfeeding rates along with other benefits. <b>Establish paid family leave for all workers.</b>  Public breastfeeding became legal in all states in 2018. Ensure community, clinical and workplace settings can be built for breastfeeding moms.
How many moms have postpartum depression or a substance abuse disorder that threatens baby's health?	How long after delivery do moms have access to ongoing care to identify and address these concerns?	More than 1/2 of pregnancy related deaths happen postpartum. As Medicaid covers 44% of MI births, <b>expand postpartum coverage from 60 days to 12 months.</b>

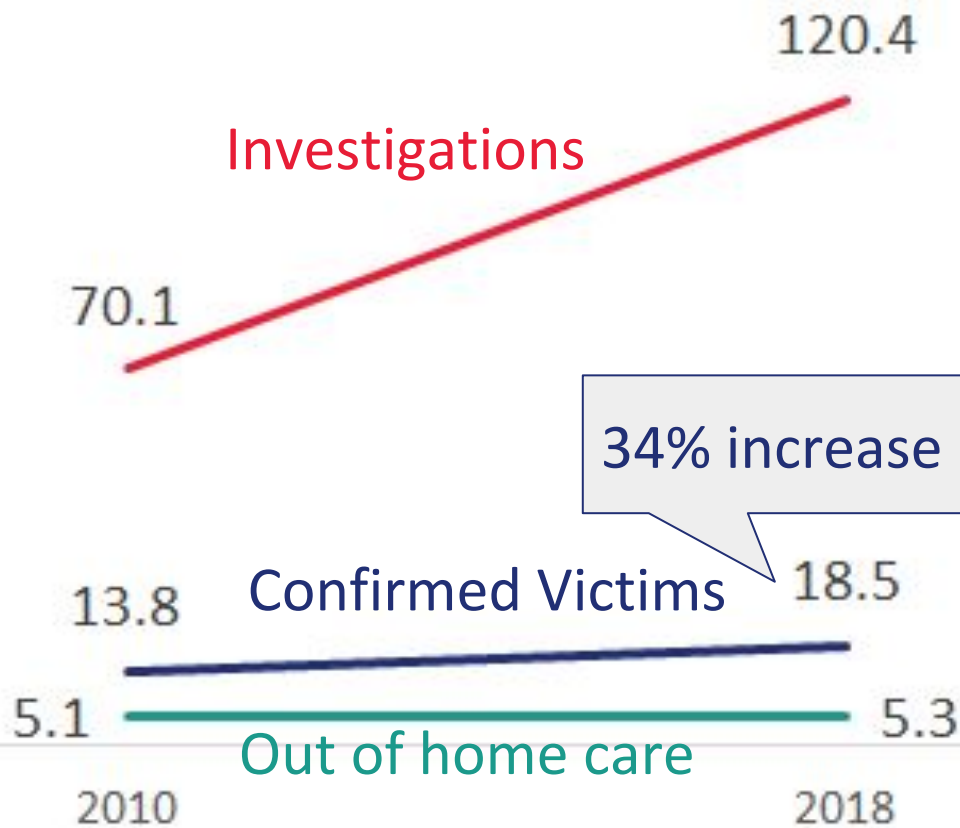

## Policy Target

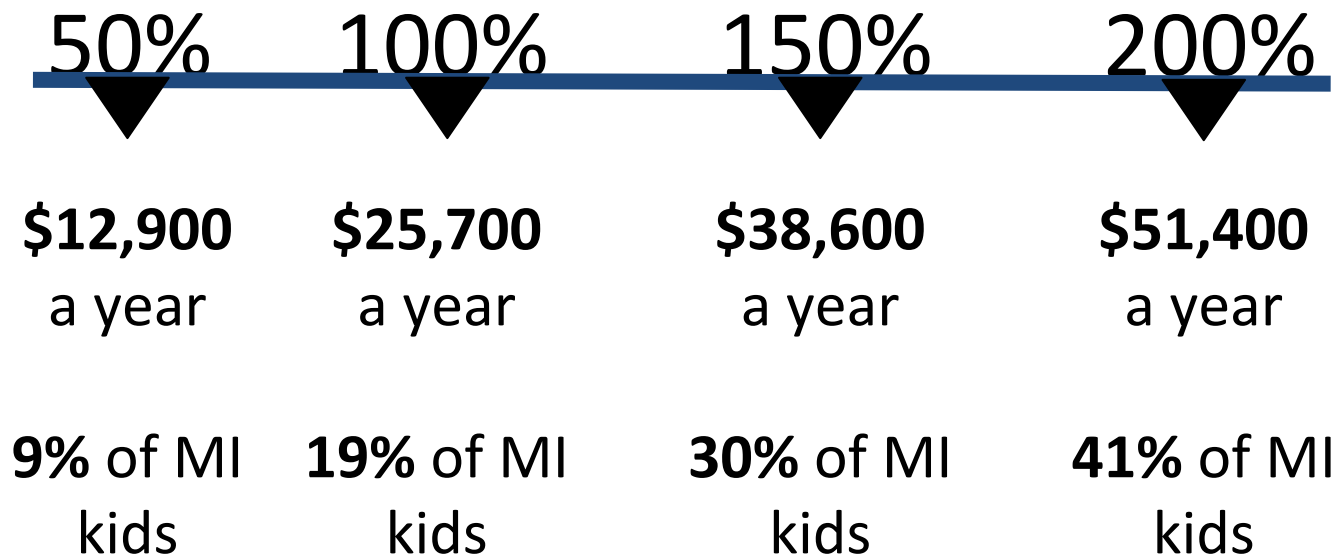
Invest in child abuse and neglect prevention programs
